## Parcels containing Jewellery.

THE FOREIGN AND COLONIAL PARCEL POST AMENDMENT (No. 99) WARRANT, 1920. DATED DECEMBER 14, 1920.

We, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers given to us by the Post Office Acts, 1908 to 1920,(a) and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of His Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:-

Short title.

1. This Warrant may be cited as "The Foreign and Colonial Parcel Post Amendment (No. 99) Warrant, 1920."

Warrant to be read with existing warrants.

2. This Warrant shall be read as one with the Foreign and Colonial Parcel Post Warrant, 1906, (b) and all Warrants amending the same.

Parcels containing jewellery.

- 3. (1) There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any parcel containing jewellery which exceeds in value £400, or, in the case of an insured parcel, the maximum sum payable by way of compensation in respect of insured parcels under the relative Agreement between the Postmaster-General and a British Possession or Foreign Country.
- (2) A parcel containing jewellery posted in or addressed to a country from or to which insured parcels are transmissible by post shall not be conveyed by post unless the same is insured to the full value thereof.

- (3) An outgoing parcel containing jewellery which, though addressed to a country to which insured parcels are not transmissible by post, would pass through a country to which insured parcels are so transmissible, shall not be conveyed by post unless the parcel is insured to the full value thereof in respect of the part of its transmission with regard to which the parcel can be insured.
- 4. This Warrant shall come into operation on the 17th day Commenceof January, 1921.
